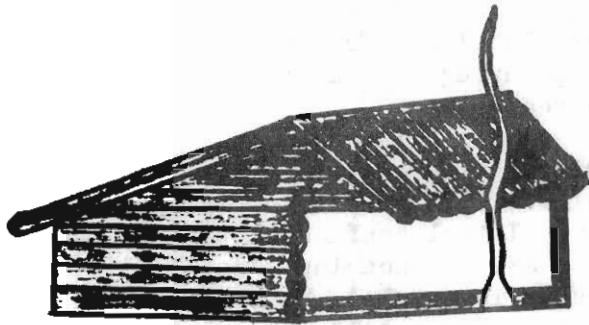

Anyone thinking that there isn't much enthusiasm among IOCA clubs these days is either too lazy to do anything about it or else has their head in the wrong place! One of the new IOCA clubs, the Colorado State Outing Club, attended IOCA CONFERENCE last month *in force* - nine undergraduates (including one from the University of Northern Colorado Outdoor Club), a new IOCALum and myself. Traveling over 3,700 miles, round trip, with everyone and their gear stuffed into one large van-bus created a few problems, but we all made it to West Virginia, anyway!

Somewhere in the neighborhood of eighty IOCA's showed up for IOCA CONFERENCE, representing at least twenty clubs. NEW IOCALUM SECRETARY



As I mentioned earlier, there weren't too many IOCALums at Conference. In fact, I ended up being the only candidate for IOCALum Secretary at the alum meeting! I think many of you already know me, or know of me, but if my name doesn't ring a bell, here's a biographical sketch - I was IOCA Executive Secretary during the 1969-1971 school years (yeah, I was crazy enough to run things a second year!) and graduated from the University of Delaware in 1971 with a B. S. in entomology. That fall, I went job-hunting in North Carolina. Didn't find too much work, but I was able to help re-activate the North Carolina State Outing Club (two carloads of NCSOCers attended the 1972 IOCA Conference in Connecticut). Served as editor of the *IOCA Bulletin* during the 1972-1973 school year and ran wild in North Carolina until last year. Since last July, I have been employed as publications editor for a grasslands ecology lab at Colorado State University (they're actually paying me to write a newsletter!) and was faculty advisor for the CSU Student Grotto until it metamorphosed into the Colorado State Outing Club. I haven't done much rock climbing lately, but backpacking, snowshoeing, caving, day trips and square dancing keeps me busy. Played around with organizing IOCA-West this year, but spent most of my time trying to interest CSOC in IOCA (successful in some aspects, but a lot of continual explaining is still necessary, I'm afraid). Although I enjoy club-level square dancing (every week, in fact), I miss the IOCA-type square dances - and I also miss the l-o-n-g drives to attend IOCA trips. It's different out here, when you can lead day trips in a National Park, less than fifty miles away!

NEW FEATURES IN THE NEWSLETTER

Beginning with this issue, I will publish a regular listing of current job openings for college graduates (mostly for those with Bachelor or Master degrees) - careers in business, government, universities, colleges, secondary teaching and other fields (whatever information I can get my hands on, essentially!). In addition, beginning with the fall newsletter, I will carry news from the various IOCA clubs, hopefully including your old clubs as well as any clubs located near you. Club news pertaining to meetings, programs, trips, contacts and other good things about your club will appear in future newsletters. I wrote a letter to each club, asking for their cooperation on this feature. If there's a particular club you'd like to hear about, let me know and I'll make a special effort to secure and publish information on that outing club.

IOCALUM SURVEY

As you can see, I've continued my close affiliation with undergraduates in IOCA, long after graduation, and I want to remain actively-involved with them for as long as possible. Such an association keeps me up-to-date on college students and, because of this association, I strongly feel that IOCA must remain in the hands of the undergraduates, if we IOCALums want IOCA to survive and even flourish. I had advocated this "radical" idea a few years ago (*IOCALum News*, July 1971, page 6-7) and my opinion has not changed since that time.

My biased opinions regarding IOCA and IOCALum were rather strongly reinforced several months ago when I invested some time and money to question one hundred IOCAns (non-IOCALums, former IOCALums, current IOCALums) about IOCALum and IOCA. Fifty-seven IOCAns responded, many at length, and their responses clearly indicated that a small handful of alums have contributed heavily to the downfall of IOCA enthusiasm, mainly because of their attitudes. I was able to get the *Survey and Partial Analysis of IOCALum* compiled and published in time for distribution at IOCA Conference last month. Extra copies are available from me, if you weren't at Conference this year.

Several suggestions for improving IOCALum were mentioned in the Survey, particularly in the areas of membership recruiting and alum activities. *ONE VERY OBVIOUS AND NECESSARY CHANGE THAT WAS FREQUENTLY CITED WAS THAT OF THE ATTITUDES OF CERTAIN IOCALUMS!* The actions of a few IOCALums during the elections at the 1971 IOCA Conference in Maryland has not been forgotten by many who were undergraduates then. Also cited was the fact that the IOCALums who complain the most about IOCA are the ones who also do nothing to improve IOCA. They seem to continue to attend IOCA functions, but they also continue to complain outloud about the undergraduates and their handling of IOCA. This is just plain illogical - if you really don't like "present-day" IOCA, there's nothing to prevent you from not attending IOCA trips!

Personally, I think an "IOCA, love it or leave it" attitude is just as foolish as an "America, love it or leave it" philosophy, and I don't advocate either one. If you don't really like present-day IOCA, then quite complaining and get yourself involved with the outing club near you, even if it's not yet in IOCA. The undergraduates are just as capable of handling IOCA matters today, as they were two decades ago - if we keep quiet and leave them alone! If some of us alums insist on interfering with the undergraduates' enthusiasm, we will have only ourselves to blame when the undergraduates chuck the whole idea of IOCA - and IOCALum.

Officially, as IOCALum Secretary, and in practice, as an active outing clubber, my policy shall be to continue to FULLY SUPPORT the undergraduates and their handling of IOCA. At the 1972 IOCA Conference in Connecticut, it was "resolved" that the IOCALum Secretary shall serve as a "special advisor" to the IOCA Executive Secretary and provide what assistance he or she can in that capacity. I was against this policy then and I still am, only because no IOCALum Secretary is qualified to serve as a "special advisor" unless he or she has also served as IOCA Executive Secretary. The only qualified "special advisors" are the past Exec. Secs. and they don't need to be IOCALum Secretary to function in that capacity! Former Exec. Secs. probably had always helped new Exec. Secs., anyway, without having any fancy title! I remember the excellent assistance offered to me by *Al, Ron and Wendy* when I was in office, and in appreciation of their willingness to assist me, I had offered my talents to *Mike, Kent, Ellis, Keith and Joy*. However, nothing is forced on the new Executive Secretaries - assistance is always available for the asking.

One of the best ways to widely publicize IOCALum to all of the active IOCA's is to send a complimentary copy of each *IOCALum News* to each IOCA club throughout the entire school year. This I plan to do, and I will enclose in each club copy a request to circulate the newsletters to all of the club's seniors and to all other interested members. IOCALum is definitely a valuable organization - this is quite obvious to us present IOCALums and is even so to the non-IOCALums who responded to the IOCALum Survey (see page 4). 460 copies of this newsletter was mailed out, distributed as follows:

153 current IOCALums, including those whose memberships expired last December.

135 graduates from 1-5 years ago who had never joined IOCALum, yet we still maintain correspondence between each other, with a letter enclosed to interest them in IOCALum.

87 past IOCALums, with a letter enclosed to re-interest them in IOCALum.

85 IOCA clubs, with a letter of recruitment enclosed for club seniors.

Figuring out exactly what to briefly say in those enclosed letters was a lot harder than writing this newsletter! Being extremely long-winded, I've always found it difficult to talk briefly about IOCA and I'm having similar problems with IOCALum. However, I was finally able to cut my publicity down to one sheet, with information adequate enough to really interest the seniors into IOCALum, without boring them. Time will tell, I reckon . . .

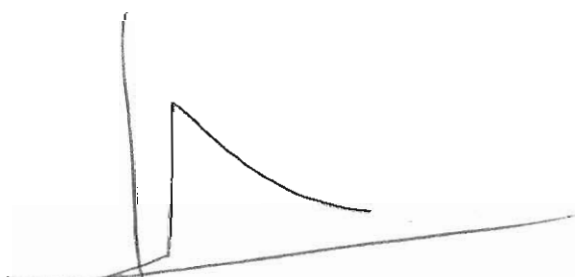
